Also, giving others the opportunity to express their opinions is considered a democratic value. Regarding the value of tolerance, high school students have an understanding of the importance of respecting the beliefs or religions of their friends. They agree that all religions teach goodness, depending on how these teachings are applied in life. Out of 157 students, 4 of them admitted to making sarcastic or derogatory jokes about other religions. The existence of this fact, according to the author, is part of the normalization of jokes that may not be understood by students. Religion, as one of the sensitive issues, is still made an object of ridicule.
